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editorial

Dear readers,

In this seventh issue of the ECML Newsletter we would like to draw your attention on the issue about children and computer: nice topic isn't it? How many of you have a computer at home? And an Internet connection? How many children, little friends or nephews and nieces do you have? How much time do they spend using it? How do they use it?

"Across the world there is a passionate love affair between children and computers ... And more than wanting [computer technology], they seem to know that in a deep way it already belongs to them. They know they can master it more easily and more naturally than their parents. They know they are the computer generation." **Seymour Papert**, *The Connected Family*, 1996.

This is the beginning of a good article entitled *"Children and Computer Technology: Analysis and Recommendations"* of **Margie K. Shields and Richard E. Behrman**, that I found surfing the Internet about children and ICT. It examines how children are affected by the emerging world of computers. It explores how computer use is affecting children's physical, intellectual, social, and psychological development; whether computers are increasing or decreasing the disparities between rich and poor; and whether computers are being used effectively to enhance classroom instruction.

Nowadays, children play, search for information, study, interact and communicate with computer technology transforming their everyday lives in profound ways.

Feeding children's passion for computers and facing the digital divide billions of private or public dollars or euros have been spent or are still being spent to give children access in school, at home, and/or in the community. One of the latest initiatives in this regard is the project launched by **Nikolas Negroponte** at the MIT Media Lab: the development of a \$100 laptop a technology to revolutionize how we educate the world's children. A new non-profit association, „One Laptop per Child“ (OLPC), has been created for this purpose. A prototype of this laptop was unveiled by UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan and Negroponte on 16. Nov. 2005 at the World Summit on the Information Society in Tunisia.

But is computer technology improving children's lives?

Use of computer technology is on the rise and as a result, researchers, teachers and media professionals are questioning the impact it has on children in relation to their cognitive development, social development, physical and psychological development as well as the potential effects on their education.

This is not the first time that concern has been raised over the effect that new technology has on children. Similar reactions have accompanied each new introduction of media technology in the last few decades. In the 1990s, arguments ensued about the harmful effects of computer games and violent videos (see EMRL issue n.5). Other concerns which have been made throughout history in relation to other media such as theatre, newspaper, cinema, radio and television, since they would have a damaging effect on impressionable young minds.

The recent concern over the effect that computer technology has on children prompted significant research to clarify the issue. Most of it can be found on the article "*ICT and children*" (see [ecml](#) content repository) in which it is stated that some positive and negative effects are beginning to emerge. There is much discussion on the potential benefits of computer technology and the possible future consequences such as e-commerce, the virtual classroom and cyber-democracy. Some research suggests computer technology hinders a children cognitive development, whereas others indicate that the use of computer technology is a building block for cognitive development and is linked to slightly better academic performance.

Before going into moral panic we have to ask us: Why is a computer important? Who needs access to ICT and what for? How can we be sure that access leads to positive learning experiences at school and at home? As computers become ubiquitous in our daily lives, it is important to understand how computer technology can enhance or detract from a child's growth and development.

We must not forget that a computer technology is only a tool and whether it serves to improve children's lives depends on how it is used. Sharing Margie K. Shields and Richard E. Behrman's opinion, we can give some inputs in order to help ensuring that children use computers in ways that improve their current and future lives:

- First, children need to acquire the necessary skills to use the computer (also paying attention to their sight and sitting posture) and navigate the digital world effectively and responsibly. Parents, teachers, and other adults who work with children can teach them to use it properly;
- Second, children must have opportunities to use computer technology more actively to create, design, invent, and collaborate with children in other classrooms and communities;
- Third, decrease disparities between rich and poor, thus reducing the digital divide among children;
- Finally, explore ways to use technology effectively in the classroom, in order to increase children's educational experience.

As we have already announced in the previous issue of the newsletter, the Austrian and the Italian **ecml** teams have organised their national workshops. These events took place at the end of October and now we would like to tell you about our experiences.

Media Education in Austria: Workshop “Get ready for working in the digital age!”

On 21st October 2005 the Centre for Social Innovation organised, within the project **ecml**, a conference on media competences, e-learning and e-skills in Vienna. These subjects were analysed from a pedagogical and economic point of view, and the event grouped together several experts from all over the country.

Josef Hochgerner, scientific manager of ZSI and **Reinhold Hawle** from the Ministry of Education, Science and Culture officially opened the workshop. Following their presentations, **Tapio Varis** from the University of Tampere and **Franz Gramlinger** from CEDEFOP discussed about media education and e-skills by providing also references to analyse both

The European Centre for Media Literacy ecml was also presented at the “**World Summit on the Information Society**” in Tunis through Marja Heinonen and Tapio Varis from the University of Tampere and Elke Dall from the Centre for Social Innovation. The event was held between 16 and 18 November 2005 in the form of 308 parallel events, an international exhibition on ICT4ALL and several plenary sessions. It attracted around 19.000 participants from more than 800 entities including UN agencies, private sector companies and civil society organizations. The Summit was convened in Tunis to discuss the “digital divide” and the potential of information and communication technologies to drive development. ecml was presented to the international audience at the stand of the Finnish Virtual University and through personal and media contacts.

Illegal and harmful content on the internet – EU-25 comparative highlights

by the Gallup Organisation Hungary

The Standard Eurobarometer and the Candidate Countries Eurobarometer interviewed 28,340 citizens in 28 European countries that are either the members of or candidates to the European Union. This Eurobarometer report records some results concerning the safer internet use: half of the children in the enlarged EU do not use the Internet, European adolescents face the most rules and limitations in how they use the Internet, Internet-related rules are mostly targeted to protect privacy, restrict indecent content and communication, and limit the time spent online, forty-eight percent of families feel the need to be more informed about Internet safety, four in 10 parents do not know where to report illegal content. UK Children Go Online: Emerging Opportunities and Dangers

This final report describes the key findings and recommendations of a major two year research project investigating 9-19 year olds' internet use, UK Children Go Online

(UKCGO). The authors analysed results from a national, in-home, face to face survey of young people aged 9-19 and a written questionnaire to their parents. The research was funded by an Economic and Social Research Council grant under the e-Society Programme. The survey provides a deep insight into the following topics: access to the internet, the nature of internet use, inequalities and the digital divide, education, learning and literacy, communication, participation, the risks of undesirable content, the risks of online communication, regulating the internet at home, balancing opportunities and risks, the persistence of demographic influences on internet use, a parental wish list, a last word from young people themselves, summary and conclusions. Insafe is a network of national nodes that coordinates Internet safety awareness in Europe. Projects are co-funded by European Commission's Safer Internet Programme. On the list of national awareness nodes you can find the project of your country.

The mission of Insafe members is to empower citizens to use the Internet, as well as other information and communication technologies, safely and effectively. Insafe promotes positive, ethical use of online information and communication technologies. The network calls for shared responsibility for the protection of the rights and needs of citizens, in particular children and youths, by government, educators, parents, media, industry and all other relevant actors.

The range of topics reaches from illegal and unwanted content, viruses and spam over data protection, copyright issues to chatting, as well as mobile and other emerging technologies.

On a concrete level the national awareness nodes carry out media work, organise events, provide target groups with background information, educational materials and practical tips on the issue of Internet safety and work together closely with all relevant stakeholders in the particular country.
